Community of Practice Kick-Off

The [GreenVET4U project](#) has launched the EU-Uganda Community of Practice (CoP) to foster collaboration among VET practitioners, educators, and private stakeholders.

This network will co-create innovative curricula and digital tools designed to meet the needs of green jobs in Uganda. A key objective is to engage the private sector in vocational education and create work-based learning opportunities. The CoP aims to generate new project ideas and develop a long-term strategy for VET curricula, including establishing a Virtual Innovation Lab that will continue to operate beyond the project's duration.

Second Transnational Partners Meeting

The second Transnational Partners Meeting (TPM2) of GreenVET4U took place in Frankfurt, where project partners reviewed ongoing tasks and planned upcoming activities. In addition to internal discussions, the team visited local green initiatives, including waste management facilities and a sustainable hotel, to gain insights into best practices for sustainability. Presentations from institutions like KfW and GIZ further enriched discussions on climate action and women's empowerment, aligning the project's goals with global green transformation efforts.

The Impact of the GreenVET4U project

GreenVET4U is driving international collaboration between Uganda and three European countries to modernize vocational education for green jobs. By integrating knowledge from different cultural contexts, the project aims to develop innovative solutions that meet Uganda's labor market needs while aligning with national and global sustainability agendas, such as Uganda Vision 2040 and the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. The project's long-term impact is expected to extend beyond its implementation period, with potential for replication in other regions.
